He walked away as I mumbled, “I’m so sorry. God bless you.”

With just his few words, I felt ashamed that I’d dared to worry about my comfort level while I collected coins for those in need of a roof over their head, warm clothes to wear, or perhaps a loving family to treasure and hold dear.

I vowed to continue teaching my children to give to the needy and serve others compassionately, but I let the young man’s words serve as a reminder to check my pride and rid my heart of a righteous attitude.

I think I’ll write that check for the Children of Morningstar today, but there’s no need for trumpets. I can share their need of support to others, but I’ll do my giving in secret.
